
group of 17 active and alumni brothers were nestled into a conference room at Lakeview Resort for a leadership retreat on a cold January (24th) day. Suddenly, **Zach Mendelson '79** passed a letter on to the group that he had just opened... containing a check for \$100,000 from **Bob Douglas '50** in memory of **Sam Morris '47**. The check was GREAT, but the letter behind it brought tears to your eyes.

"Sam was a proud Phi Psi who loved fraternity sports and everyone at 780 Spruce Street. He enjoyed taking our housemother to ballet in Pittsburgh. His natural smile and hello became everlasting. The Phi Psi house was Sam's home," noted Douglas in his letter.

As campaign chair, I called Brother Douglas that night to thank him for not only his donation but the meaning that the letter expressed. It was a fraternal conversation.

A month later, I was aware that Brother Douglas was going to be at Founders Day and I was eager to meet him. In his letter he talked about standing on the front lawn looking over the city and dreaming of what might be.

"It sits on the front of the hill as a beacon of life and fraternal love for all those that enter its doors. I am proud to



have this opportunity to help in the restoration work of our house at 780 Spruce Street. I hope that every member will put their shoulder to the wheel in order that we may return this house to its former state of beauty and comport, "continued Douglas.

The afternoon of Founder's Day, the house was full of chatter, but I noticed a brother standing alone outside on the front lawn and I knew it had to be Brother Douglas. I hated to interrupt his thoughts and after a minute I approached and introduced myself. What a gracious and humble person. He grew up in a coal camp

of McDowell County in southern West Virginia and came to Morgantown in 1949.

As part of his growing up, he twirled a baton and was recognized as more than good with scholarship offers to many schools including Michigan. He declined an offer from the Wolverines... and came to WVU where he was introduced to Phi Kappa Psi. Due to his lack of family (both parents were deceased), Morgantown and particularly WV Alpha became his home.

Brother Douglas was recognized during the Founder's Day Dinner, and he related several mischievous adventures he experienced with Brother Morris and others. Attending the dinner was Sam's widow, Barbara, and her son, **David** "Fuzzy" Morris '73.

Brother Douglas is a respected lawyer in Charleston (WV), with the law firm, Carey, Scott & Douglas, PLCC. He was accompanied by his current wife, Nancy.

The fraternity is thankful that he was in a position to give back and honor a fellow brother and the fraternity. Much has occurred since the last update. Our donations and pledges stand at \$285,850 which covers the cost of what we did last summer. We have had another pledge of \$100,000 and we are close to a pledge of this amount with another brother. I will let you know who when all is settled.

A key concern of mine is that only 89 brothers have contributed to date. This is 5.9% of the living brothers. What are we doing about it? First it is important to get brothers back to the house so they can see where their money is being spent. We will have a summer picnic as we did last year. I do not have the date (of this event) at this writing.

I have talked about visiting areas to make a presentation. Some of you have responded. This will be my number one priority. We have also added Captains which is an amazing help and gets results. One of our biggest areas that has gone undeveloped is New Jersey. Brother Adam Blum has stepped up and agreed to assist with all pledges brothers in the New Jersey area. Thanks Adam.

Current Captains have helped a lot and now I am asking for more. Please revisit your list and share with them what is happening. The personal approach is always the best. If for some reason you can not carry out your commitment, I understand, as things change. Let me know and I will give you help. I'll do the leg-work, you sign the letter and do the phone call follow-up. I am open to any ideas.

We can not control the economy, and hopefully it will bounce back. Our House Corporation committee met last week and decided to go forward with this summers' renovations realizing this may put us in a mortgage situation. We felt we had no alternative. The house is full for the Fall semester...partly based on the anticipated renovations. Recruiting is such a major part of our plan bringing in quality men with good academics... good attitudes... and good leaders!

Bottom line is we need to hit \$800,000 total donated by the end of 2009 to make the mortgage doable. We continue to work with the bank building loan so we have the cash flow at this point.

This summer we will re-wire the house, replumb the house and redo all bath

The Charleston native, who currently resides in Chicago, is president of Woodrum, Inc, a national hospital turnaround and transitional management company.

He has been president of hospitals in Maryland, West Virginia, Texas, and Saudi Arabia. He also served as Executive Vice President and Chief Operating Officer of the American Hospital Association. He has certainly distinguished himself within the health care industry over the last 30+ years.

rooms (two are 1940 era), add a sprinkler system which will significantly lower our insurance and meet code, do some small structural changes inside and the biggest cost will be heating and air-conditioning. The HVAC will also lower our costs. None of this is nice to do stuff.

To raise further capital, we will be keeping the house open in the summer months, as the chapter members will sign a 12-month contract beginning with the 2009-2010 school term.

<u>Linda James</u>, our house director, has signed on for another year which we are very happy about. Bob Lazzell has agreed to

spend more time at he house. Bob directed our first leadership retreat in January for our actives. Very successful.

We believe we are on the right path to success. If there is anything that you want me to do, please let me know. The magic number in my mind is \$414,000. If all remaining brothers contributed at the \$1000 level. We would be at \$1.4M. We can dream.

Roger Neighborgall & Bob Reynolds Deliver Timely Messages

Our Founder's Day speakers have distinguished themselves to be among the best of the best in their respective fields. We were fortunate to have both of them share their perspective and insight during our chapel and dinner programs.

Roger Neighborgall '42—Chapel Service Speaker

He pledged in 1942, but had not returned to the fraternity house since 1945—*sixty-four years later*—to address chapter members and alumni at our annual Founder's Day Service, February 21, 2009, in the Memorial Chapel.

Born in 1923, the Hoosier native came to Buckhannon, WV following his father's (work) transfer. Following his sophomore year at WVU, he volunteered to join the armed forces. At the end of

the war, he went back to school (at Duke) and graduated in 1948.

Neighborgall recounted his experiences in the European theater. Assigned to the U.S. Army 5th Ranger Battalion in 1944, he took part in the Normandy, Northern France, Rhineland, Ardennes-Alsace, and the central Europe campaigns and was awarded the Silver Star, Bronze Star & Combat Infantry Badge.

Brother Neighborgall inspired everyone with his vivid details of having served our country since the mid-1940's. "There are not many of us left who can talk about our (war) experiences, and I want the younger generation to know what World War II was all about."

Neighborgall doesn't have any regrets about joining the army. "Very clearly, the war made me mature. My college grades were better after the war than before it. You look at life in a different way when you realize people can die. I saw lots of people killed...but time started to heal things like that," revealed Neighborgall.

Like so many other brothers who pledged in the early

40's, their time in Morgantown was cut short as a result of the war. Duty called!

Bob Reynolds '71—Dinner Keynote Speaker
